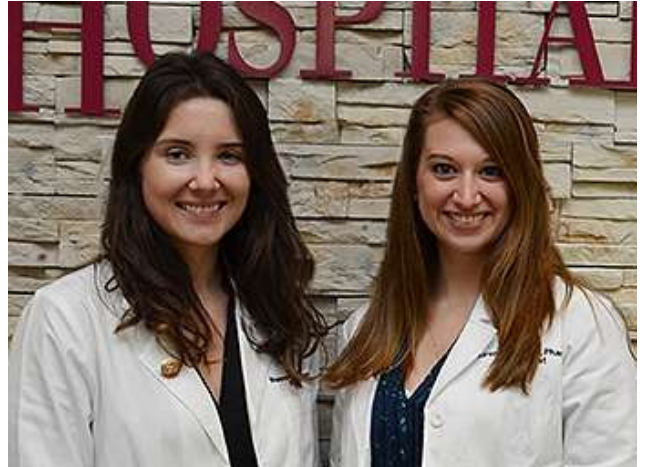

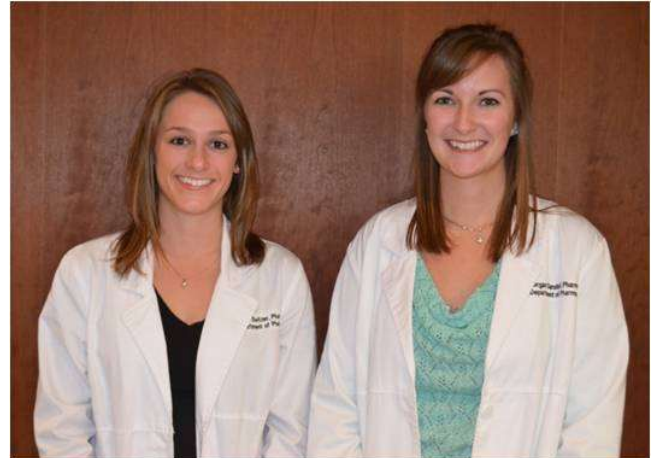

Core Learning Experiences

(Required & Elective)

Residency Orientation (Required)

Residency orientation starts in late June, after New Employee Orientation to the health system. Orientation is intended to orient the resident to program and practice environment. The orientation block will include training on computer-based order entry and verification, bar-code scanning, electronic health record navigation, documentation, dispensing, IV admixtures, automated dispensing cabinets, packaging, storage, distribution, and controlled substance processes. Each resident will be introduced to the pharmacist code response training with an emphasis on code cart navigation, BLS, and ACLS. Orientation to the residency program purpose, structure, policies, manual, the ASHP Standard, and required & elective CAGOs will occur. The remainder of the learning experience will include orientation & training for longitudinal staffing, discussions about resiliency and strategies to mitigate professional burnout, an introduction to the department and health system org structures, and exposure to the responsibilities of pharmacists throughout the Health System.

Internal Medicine (Required & Elective)

Internal Medicine is scheduled as the first or second learning experience of the residency. The responsibilities of the resident include all aspects of patient care (medication histories, review of EHR, acute care medication management, consults, drug information, transitions of care, patient counseling). Each resident learns how to navigate among the patient care team (physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, respiratory therapists, nurses, social workers, and outside health care professionals) to manage their medications across the healthcare continuum. *An elective Internal Medicine II learning experience is available in the 2nd half of residency for interested residents. IM II includes opportunities for one-on-one rounding with our hospitalists, advanced independent practice on our acute care unit, and primary precepting an APPE student.*

Medical-Surgical (Required)

This experience is in conjunction with and involves the items described in internal medicine with an emphasis on post-operative care for the following surgical teams: orthopedics, spine care, general surgery, and gynecological surgery. Case discussions in this experience typically focus on anticoagulation and antimicrobial use in the perioperative period, total parenteral nutrition, surgical site infections, and pain management.

Critical Care (Required)

This learning experience focuses on the pathophysiology, treatment and prevention of disease states, and complications encountered in critical care. At the end of this rotation, residents should understand respiratory failure, ventilation and hemodynamic support, acute myocardial infarction, stroke, and common toxicology treatment pathways. The residents will actively participate in ICU

(cont'd) rounds, closely monitor safety and efficacy of treatment plans, participate in discussions of critical care topics with preceptors and/or pulmonologist, provide drug information to the healthcare team, prepare and present one nursing in-service or other rotation related project.

Emergency Medicine (Required & Elective)

Pharmacists provide patient care in the emergency department 7 days per week. Resident learning experience is customized based on the interest level of the resident. Residents will work with emergency room nurses, physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants as well as first responders, respiratory therapists, and social work. This experience emphasizes code response, including code blue, code stroke, code STEMI, and code trauma. Patients with complicated medication issues or those to be admitted receive a pharmacist consult for medication history and comprehensive medication review. Residents will also gain experience with culture results call-back. *An elective Emergency Medicine II learning experience is available in the 2nd half of residency for interested residents.*

Oncology (Required & Elective)

The Oncology Center at LMH Health is an ambulatory care clinic with five hematologists/oncologists, eighteen nurses, and fifteen treatment rooms. The Oncology Satellite Pharmacy is staffed Monday through Friday by two pharmacists and two technicians. The pharmacy primarily provides outpatient chemotherapy and supportive medications, but does oversee the limited amount of inpatient chemotherapy as well. Additional responsibilities include drug information for patients and staff, patient education, investigational drug inventory maintenance, and oncology specific formulary review. Residents also have the opportunity to shadow physicians, nursing, and in-clinic procedures. *An elective Oncology II learning experience is available in the 2nd half of residency for interested residents.*

Ambulatory Care (Selective Required)

Residents have the opportunity to provide direct patient care and work under collaborative practice agreements to optimize chronic disease state management in the ambulatory care setting as a concentrated core rotation or a longitudinal experience, depending on resident interests. Residents will develop skills in obtaining thorough medication histories, assessing appropriateness of medication regimens, counseling patients, monitoring therapies, providing drug information, and administering vaccines and clinic medications.

Transitions of Care & Geriatrics (Selective Required)

The responsibilities for this experience are similar to internal medicine with an emphasis on chronic disease management and transitions of care. The patients on this unit typically stay for greater than one week and are often transferred to and from other healthcare facilities. In this rotation, the

(cont'd) residents are exposed to the pharmacist's responsibility for meeting state regulatory requirements for skilled nursing facilities and acute rehabilitation centers. Based on the resident interest, this rotation also provides the opportunity to round with the palliative care team and psychiatric provider.

Infectious Disease (Elective)

Residents may complete this concentrated experience after successful completion of Internal Medicine/Medical-Surgical & Critical Care rotations. The resident may round one-on-one with an infectious disease specialist on consulted inpatient cases. Based on interest, the resident may set-up time to rotate through the outpatient ID clinic as well. The resident will optimize the use of evidence-based medicine through treatment of consulted patients, responding to drug information requests, and providing antimicrobial stewardship services. In addition to patient care, residents may spend time in the microbiology lab and consult with the microbiologist or pathologist as applicable.

Cardiology (Elective)

This rotation is available in the 2nd half of the residency. Residents have the opportunity to round one-on-one with the inpatient cardiologist and his or her cardiology nurse, participate in outpatient clinic appointments with a clinic cardiologist, provide education as consulted by staff in Cardiac Rehabilitation, and observe cases in the Cardiac Cath Lab. This experience helps the resident focus on cardiac related medication treatment plus understand the experience of cardiology patients as they move through the process of diagnosis, treatment and follow-up of various cardiac related conditions.

International Medical Mission Experience in Africa (Elective)

This learning experience involves collaboration with the "Kansas 2 Kenya" Medical Mission Team and Faculty at the University Of Nairobi School Of Pharmacy. The residents work with a team of physicians, nurses, pharmacists and support staff to plan a 21 day trip with 3-5 clinic days. Professional roles and responsibilities vary from year to year. Residents educate the team on travel vaccinations and assist with procurement and transportation of medications for the mission. Exposure to various Sub-Sahara tropical diseases including malaria, cholera, AIDs, tuberculosis, helminthes, pulmonary diseases and irritant eye diseases including trachoma are reviewed for this learning experience. Educational programming for the University Of Nairobi School Of Pharmacy varies with topics consistently involving the pharmacist's role in vaccinations, advancement of pharmacy services and leadership.

Longitudinal Experiences (52 weeks)

Code Response (Required)

- Residents gain a variety of experience in responding to medical emergencies including:
- Code Stroke
- Code STEMI
- Code Blue
- Medical Emergency Rapid Response Team (MET)
- Rapid Sequence Intubation (RSI)

Teaching Component (Required)

- A variety of teaching and mentoring opportunities are available including:
- Didactic classroom lectures
- Facilitation of skills lab or clinical assessment course
- Monthly resident led "Chalk Talk" topic discussions
- Monthly "Lunch & Learn" CE series presentations
- Precepting IPPE and APPE students
- Mentoring employed clinical interns
- Educational events for the community
- Teaching Certificate available

Pharmacy Leadership, Management & Medication Safety (Required)

- Residents gain an appreciation for the importance of pharmacy leadership through a series of readings, preceptor discussions, and assignments. The residents will gain understanding of the pharmacy's role in the Health-System. Residents may be involved in human resource issues including recruiting, hiring, firing, mentoring, employee evaluations and disciplinary action. Resident presence at meetings both as a member and a leader will be emphasized.
- Medication Safety
- Antimicrobial & Opioid Stewardship
- Pharmacy & Therapeutics
- Residency Administration

Staffing Service Component (Required)

- Residents staff in the inpatient pharmacy one evening every other week and every 3rd weekend. Once proficient in main pharmacy operations, residents have the opportunity to staff decentralized clinical weekend shifts. The residents gain an understanding of all pharmacy operations. The inpatient pharmacy is the hub for drug information questions for LMH Health and the community, which provides a broad learning experience for the residents. In addition to services for inpatients, the pharmacy services two infusion clinics who treat patients with a variety of disease states requiring specialty infusions or outpatient antibiotics.

Research & Quality Improvement Projects (Required)

- Residents complete one major research project to advance clinical or operational aspects of patient care. Residents serve as primary investigator & project manager. Site-specific research project ideas are shared with residents after the match and discussed during residency orientation. Residents receive support and oversight from project advisors and the Research Subcommittee of the Residency Advisory Council. A Research Certificate program is also offered to support residents throughout the research process. The primary purpose of this experience is for each resident to gain experience in the development, coordination, implementation, analysis, sustainability, and presentation of Health-System practice based research projects. All residents will create a manuscript for their major project that is suitable for submission for publication. Research results will be presented by the resident at site-specific stakeholder meetings as well as local, state, and national organization meetings.

In addition to the usual experiences of an ASHP-accredited PGY1 residency, our program offers a tight-knit community setting, customizable learning experiences, a focus on professional development, and an emphasis on resident well-being.

We offer numerous teaching, precepting & mentoring opportunities

- Serve as a preceptor for Introductory & Advanced Pharmacy Practice Experiences

Residents share a dedicated office located in the pharmacy department.

The staffing schedule is every 3rd weekend (8 hours on Saturday & Sunday) and one evening every other week.

A Research Certificate as well as a pharmacy research committee provide abundant support for residents throughout the longitudinal research process.
